LESSON

LIPS ON FIRE

In his introduction to self-development, Rav Wolbe stresses that before a person even begins to do any actual work on any of his middos, he should say to himself for a half an hour every single day for several weeks, "Bishvili nivrah ha'olam – the world was created for me". He should say this to himself again and again, not in a monotonous, robotic kind of way. The correct way, Rav Wolbe exclaims, is for a person to consistently tell himself, "Bishvili nivrah ha'olam" with his 'lips on fire'! This message is one that is vital for each person's psyche to truly experience.

FOR MY PATH

EROM THE SOURCE: It is crucial to explore the meaning of 'Bishvili nivrah ha'olam' in order to say this with 'lips on fire!' This Mishnah often sounds extremely dramatic and people often assume that this is an expression, but not the reality.

Imagine a world that is devastated by a severe natural disaster, *chas v'shalom*, and you manage to avoid the destruction by hiding out in a remote cave. As you realize that the world as you know it is gone, you begin to wonder, in breathinst fright, *Will the sun rise tomorrow morning?* As dawn grows closer, the question becomes urgent, until at ass, the lift rays of the sun glow at the edges of the horizon. The ground could be filled with smoldering as and you can be the only human being on Earth. And the sun will rise... *for you*. This is the literal understanding of *Bishvili nivrah ha'olam*. Each person should live with the passion that he is this individual. Becausethe is.

Y POWERFUL ACTIONS

FROM THE SQUECE. The Nefesh Hachaim states an important principle:

וזאת תורת האדם, כל איש ישראל אל יאמר בלבו ח"ו כי מי אני, מה כחי לפועל במעשי השפלים שום ענין בעולם. א Antember of Klal Yisrael must never say to himself, chas v'shalom, 'what am I [worth], and what power do I have to accomplish anything significant through my lowly actions...?

Amazingly, every Yid's single action is dynamite, with a powerful, explosive impact on the universe. Each Yid may not realize it, but he is wildly powerful. One 'minor' decision that a person makes in the privacy of his home in New York can impact the lives of people miles away – or even years later! The Nefesh Hachaim explains that every small detail of every action leaves a mark not just on his immediate surroundings, but on the whole universe, for eternity.

✓ FROM THE SOURCE: The Rambam says that when a person is making a decision regarding whether to do a certain.

action or not, he should view the world with an urgent mindset. He should envision that that the current state of the world is 'chatzi chayav and chatzi zakai – half guilty and half innocent' and it is his action that will sway the entire world to either side. The Rambam says that a person should do this because incredibly, this is the reality! The power of one person's one positive action is so significant that it actually sways the entire world to the side of zakai.

FROM THE SOURCE: The Michtav M'Eliyahu states this idea powerfully:

This [opportunity] that is before him at this moment is one that was not given to any creation before and will not be given henceforth. For the choice of every moment has a different purpose that is possible to be achieved only through this person alone; in all of Creation, he and only he can fulfill this at this moment!

Rabbi Yochonon HaSandler, the Tanna, was called HaSandler because of his occupation as a shoemaker. That's right - the great tanna spent hours each day fixing shoes! One might think that it is demeaning to refer to great tanna as 'hasandlar - the shoemaker' - why refer to him by his simple occupation? The Gemara explains the way Rav Yochana performed his 'simple' occupation; with each stitch, Rabbi Yochonon was 'meyached yichudim' – that he was connecting everything he did to the one and only Source of all things.

Rav Yisrael Salanter says, Wow! What does it mean that Rabbi Yochonon was 'meyached yichudim'? It sounds like something that is very lofty and completely removed from this world! He explains that when Rabbi Yochonon created each pair of shoes, he fully invested himself in the action of producing a pair that would be wonderful for the recipient. The right fit. The warmth. The most comfortable. And his investment in the tiny technical details of shoemaking was incredibly holy as a result.

It is mind-blowing for a person to think about his daily actions. Each positive action that a person shoes with the right intention! - is lofty and holy, no matter how unimportant that action (Rav Shlomo Freifeld – In Search of Greatness)


